Our members are committed to improving the health and wellbeing of individuals by investing in preventative programs that make communities healthier, including housing and supportive housing services, workforce training and resource programs, and high-quality preschool and child care.

One of the greatest challenges to achieving better long-term health outcomes for underserved communities is the difficulty of coordinating health and social service programs. Such complexity often stymies innovative cross-sector efforts or limits the scope and scalability of initiatives at the state and local level.

We believe that in order to identify and scale effective preventative interventions, we must first build stronger evidence to identify which community-based approaches produce better health outcomes, and we must break down the barriers that impede coordination between health and social services programs.

The Social Determinants Accelerator Act will provide state, local and tribal governments, and their nonprofit and social entrepreneur partners, with additional capacity, resources and support to overcome these challenges, helping to advance this vital field.
